

HEALTH RECORD

Framework for Action

- The Framework for Action promotes collaboration and information sharing
- Developed by all Australian governments, industry, and providers
- Acts as a guide for organisations recalibrating their work programs to deliver national priorities
- Priorities for delivery by 2022 include:
 - health information that can be exchanged securely
 - made available when and where needed
 - standardised so that it can be shared in real time.

My Health Record

Keep track of your important health information in one place.

My Health Record

- On 26 November 2018, the Australian Parliament passed the *My Health Records Amendment (Strengthening Privacy) Bill 2018.*
- These measures allow Australians to choose to have a My Health Record at any time in their life. While a My Health Record was created for every Australian who wanted one after 31 January 2019, a person can delete their record permanently at any time.
- These changes are in response to the Australian community's calls for even stronger privacy and security protections for people using My Health Record.

Access by insurers and employers

- The Australian Digital Health Agency will not approve the release of an individual's personal or health information to a third party except where it is for the provision of healthcare or is otherwise authorised or required by law.
- Under these laws, no-one is permitted to access, or ask you to disclose, any information within your My Health Record for insurance or employment purposes.





Access by law enforcement and government agencies


- To date the Agency's official operating policy has been that no information within My Health Record can be released without an order from a judicial officer. The Agency has never received such a request and has never released information.
- Under the new laws, no information can be released to law enforcement or a government agency without your consent or an order from a judicial officer.






Permanent deletion of a cancelled My Health Record

- Under these laws a person can permanently delete a My Health Record at any time in their life. No archived copy or back up will be kept and deleted information won't be able to be recovered.
- A My Health Record that was cancelled in the past (and archived) was also permanently deleted. If you cancel a record at any time it will be permanently deleted.





Greater privacy for teenagers aged 14 and over

 Under these laws, once a teenager turns 14, parents will automatically be removed as authorised representatives.

Increased penalties for misuse of information


 Harsher fines and penalties apply for inappropriate or unauthorised use of information in a My Health Record. Civil fines have been increased to a maximum of \$315,000, with criminal penalties including up to 5 years' jail time.





Strengthening protections for victims of domestic and family violence

- There are currently safeguards in place to protect victims of domestic and family violence. Under these laws, the Agency is no longer obliged to notify people of certain decisions if doing so would put another person at risk.
- In addition, parents subject to a court order, where they do not have unsupervised access to their child, or who pose a risk to the life, health and safety of the child or another person are not eligible to be an Authorised Representative.
- The Agency is working and consulting with community and stakeholders to identify and reduce any potential for misuse of the My Health Record system.










Secure messaging is a national priority






