












Building the capacity of nurses to deliver mainstream hospital and community based health services to people with Intellectual Disability and Autism Spectrum Disorder



Importance of the Programme

- People with intellectual disability (ID) and/or autism(ASD) have some of the worst health outcomes when compared to the general population. They are also admitted to hospital more frequently, have longer stays, and are at risk of potentially avoidable death.
- RNs learn very little about the health needs of people with ID and/or ASD while undertaking their undergraduate education.
- There are few, if any, comprehensive continuing professional development (CPD) or post-graduate opportunities to increase knowledge and confidence in this vital area of practice.



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THE LEARNING SITE (LAUNCHED:







FOUNDATIONAL

A depository of foundational learning content (tiles, explainers, and videos) previously shared in awareness raising phase.

INTERMEDIATE

Blocks of learning and a variety of information, videos, vignettes, interviews, activities, and further reading under the six domains.

ADVANCED

Synchronous online learning sessions with experts in the area, as well as additional learning content and optional assessment.

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ADVANCED LEVEL



SYNCHRONOUS SESSIONS

Diverse topics with peers, experts, and people with lived experience.



AUDIT TOOLS AND ASSESSMENT

Opportunities for assessment, and utilisation of an audit of practice philosophy and environment.



Ability to impact their peers' knowledge, change culture and practice.

Value




