Name of organisation: Australian College of Neonatal Nurses (ACNN)

What have been the significant activities of your organisation in the last six months?

- ACNN and Branches and Special Interest Groups (SIG) continue to provide online professional development sessions. In the last 6 months there have been several sessions with diverse topics. An example of this was the Neonatal Nurse Practitioner SIG holding a S.T.A.B.L.E (expand acronym) course prior to the Annual Conference in Adelaide.
- ACNN continues to provide financial support to members including scholarships to undertake various activities, such as fees for relevant education programs and conference attendance. Applications are received three times per year, there has been a high rate of applications in 2023.
- The Australian College of Neonatal Nurses promotes Neonatal Nursing through awards. On August 15, the International day of Neonatal Nurses, the Executive presented the Neonatal Nurse Excellence Award to Dr Rose Boland for her contribution to improving neonatal outcomes through her contribution to research, clinical and educational skills. The college has also awarded a quiet achiever award to an inspiring neonatal nurse for their contribution to ACNN, neonatal nursing and neonatal care. This year, Maxine Ballinger from Rockhampton Hospital was the worthy recipient of this award. The college also runs a membership drive and Family Appreciation Award Annually.
- ACNN has a strong social media presence. This enables networking with neonatal nurses across Australia, promoting professional development opportunities, publications and guidelines that support evidence-based practice, as well as celebrating excellence in neonatal nursing practice.

When is your national conference? (Please include the details)

Australian College of Neonatal Nurses held the 2023 annual conference in Adelaide from 6 – 8 September. Invited international speakers were Dr Deborah Harris (NNP from New Zealand), Dr Charissa Patricelli and Nicole Carter, (Perinatal Addictions & Families in Recovery (FIR) programme, BC Women's Hospital, Vancouver, Canada). These speakers provided outstanding content for the conference. Over 25 abstracts were included in the program with awards presented for Best Poster and Oral Presentation. Many of the presenters received funding from the Executive, Branches and SIGs to assist with the cost to attend. It was a very successful conference this year with over 200 nurses in attendance.

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Australian College of Nursing (ACN)

ACN has undertaken much work since the last meeting, including:

Policy and Advocacy:

ACN's Nurses and Violence taskforce produced three position statements noted in the last report. Two further reports from this taskforce are currently undergoing review prior to publication. They focus on (1) the need for healthcare workers to undergo regular training, including face-to-face training, to ensure they are equipped and prepared to investigate suspected incidents of Domestic and Family Violence (DFV) and (2) for those healthcare workers who are survivors of DFV what support the workplace can provide for them and how their experiences help them to identify and support patients who are victim/survivors of DFV.

Members of three ACN Faculties and Policy Fellows are currently working in collaboration with Policy & Advocacy on papers due before the year's end.

- Aged Care Faculty Discussion Paper: Concerns and solutions to Aged Care reporting requirements.
- Advanced Practice Faculty Issues Paper: Nurse prescribing challenges and benefits.
- Nursing in the Community Faculty Discussion Paper: Working to Scope of Practice for all nurses. This work has coincided with the Cormack review, contributing to ACN's response.
- Also, we are looking at a discussion paper and a position statement on Generative AI.

ACN has welcomed a new faculty. The Mental Health Nursing Faculty aims to support nurses working in Mental Health Nursing. This Faculty brings Mental Health nurses together to provide strategic advice on policies and positions.

Friends of Parliament:

ACN held a Parliamentary Friends of Nursing session in Parliament House on 14 September. The topic for discussion was Occupational Violence Against Nurses. ACN called for action to address this issue through improvements in data collection and reporting, awareness, education and protection to address the incidence of violence affecting the profession. Amongst the recommendations was funding a national campaign (including a code of conduct and media campaign). The campaign should focus on zero tolerance to set expectations in relation to appropriate behaviours in the community and across workplace environments with a focus on healthcare interactions. Amongst the many attending were Dr Anne Webster MP, Shadow Assistant Minister for Regional Health and Member for Marlee; Dr Helen Haines MP, Member for Indi; and Senator Jess Walsh, Senator for Victoria.

Education:

ACN continues to develop timely education to meet the needs of nurses.



- The Preparation for Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) is a recent addition to the suite of courses offered. It prepares Internationally Qualified Registered Nurses (IQRN) to undertake the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia (NMBA) OSCE.
- A new unit, Principles of Intellectual and Developmental Disability Nursing, has recently been developed. It is designed for nurses who work with people with intellectual and developmental disabilities across their lifespan in various settings, from the home to the hospital. It is available as part of a Graduate Certificate degree or as a stand-alone module.

In professional development, the following courses have been added:

- Comprehensive Assessment of the Older Person aims to support nurses working with older people in developing their role and advancing their clinical skills, both as autonomous clinicians and as multidisciplinary team members.
- Principles of Primary Health Nursing will help nurses understand the principles and models that underpin primary healthcare in Australia.
- Clinical Issues in Aged Care 1 aims to support nurses working with older people, developing their role and advancing clinical skills. It focuses on three clinical issues: delirium, wound management, and continence management.
- Urinary Catheterisation. Urinary catheter insertion is a standard procedure when managing hospitalised and community-based patients. This course provides learners with evidence-based knowledge on risk prevention and reduction, management of problems associated with urinary catheterisation procedures and appropriate urinary catheter maintenance and care.
- Lymphoedema Management provides evidence-based research and current treatment guidelines to assist nurses in managing people with lymphoedema and Lipoedema. Lymphoedema is associated with many physical and psychological challenges affecting sufferers' quality of life and general well-being.

ACN's <u>new immunisation course</u> went live on 1 August. The National Immunisation Program for Healthcare Practitioners course is based on the <u>National Immunisation Education Framework for Health Professionals (2017)</u>. It has been accredited by the ANMAC subsidiary <u>Health Education Services Australia (HESA)</u> to deliver this course.

Australian College of PeriAnaesthesia Nurses (ACPAN)

What have been the significant activities of your organisation in the last six months?

- The Board attended a comprehensive governance training provided by Associations Forum.
- The Board has extensively reviewed their constitution and organisational structure. If the constitution is approved at the AGM, ACPAN will become a company limited by guarantee and its name will change into Australasian College of Perianaesthesia Nurses (abbreviation maintains the same).
- The Board has decided to contract a association management bureau to deal with the daily operational issues and is now preparing the transition. The main aim of this step is to free up time of Board members so they can focus on content and secondly, improve quality of communication and benefits for members.
- ACPAN has won the bid for the World Congress of Nurse Anaesthetists 3-6 May 2026 by IFNA in Brisbane. The bid is supported by the Queensland Office of the Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer (OCNMO), Brisbane Convention and entertainment centre (BCEC) and the Brisbane city economic forum.
- ACPAN has prepared a formal training guide for sedation nurses at a AQF8 level. Together with GENCA, and maybe some other interested nursing colleges, will now initiate a national consultation round among its members.

Name of organisation: Australian Dermatology Nurses Association

What have been the significant activities of your organisation in the last six months?

A new ADNA President was elected Vivienne Spiers. Long Serving President Karen Dazkiw, who served ADNA as president for 5 years, steering the ship over the uncertainty of 2 years of COVID lockdowns and no face to face conferences, stepped down. ADNA owes her a debt of gratitude for her untiring work and the educational opportunities she has created that were 6 years ago, just a dream. The vacant roles on the committee were filled on the day of the conference which was very encouraging. In previous years we have struggled to attract members to take on these leadership roles.

The new committee have been busy over the months since the previous CoNNMO meeting.

There were further meetings with Australasian College of Dermatologists and the Skin Health Institute to continue work on unifying/consolidating and standardising nurses education and skills. First Draft of skills for enrolled nurses in dermatology has been circulated to committee for feedback. Then the draft will go out for wider member feedback.

Continued development of the education section and nurses' communication section of the ADNA members website. There are now various links to no-cost online educational opportunities relevant to nursing practice, knowledge translation and dermatological nursing. The new Nurses' Q & A section also has resource sharing and blogs in the protected site.

Annual ADNA Conference was held May 27th-29th 2023. Two day event was very well attended and a success. Popular were the practical, participatory workshops by specialist physicians and specialist nurses or nurse practitioners. Feedback from attendees that they did increase their knowledge and skills in the comprehensive care of patients in a range of dermatological conditions and wounds. CPR training was again booked out. Nurse Deryn Thompson also presented on patient education skills at the GP day held by ADNA on the Friday.

ADNA representatives (n= 4) attend the World Congress in Dermatology (WCD) "Dermatology Beyond in Singapore, July 4th -8th 2023. Important professional connections were made. Many ground-breaking presentations, including the future of Artificial intelligence in estimating the severity of a patient's disease by mobile phone photography. For example Scoring of Atopic Dermatitis. Al may potentially help patients be more pro-active with managing a range of chronic dermatological conditions. Members of the World Health Organisation and passion projects linked to dermatology were showcased. The translation and sharing of knowledge among many experts were awe-inspiring. The president has already shared with members who could not go some her learning. ADNA's contribution did Australia proud. Australian Dermatology Nurse-led clinics, models of person-centred care and dermatology research projects involving nurses. Three conference presentations—1) Melanoma research and melanography; 2) Eczema management and initiatives and insights into skin of colour; 3) Evidence-based professional development: the Australian College of Nursing (ACN) Graduate Certificate of Dermatology Nursing were very well received.

 nationally. This process and the duplication of effort needs to be reconsidered please.

We are keen to develop a certifying/credentialing process for nurses as the GESA, RACS and RACP Conjoint Committee for the Recognition of Training in Gastrointestinal Endoscopy (CCRTGE) and the Recertification in Colonoscopy Conjoint Committee (RCCC) do not accept nurses to apply for recognition of training in endoscopy or recertification.

Nurses currently do this within their employing health facility submitting the same required data matching the KPIs required to obtain recognition firstly upon completion of training the recertification data every 3 years. GENCA as a nursing professional group are willing to develop a recognition and recertification group to a nationally accepted status to create a pathway for nurses to obtain this recognition.

National Health Workforce Data Collection (AHPRA)

"Disability Nursing" was added to the AHPRA annual health workforce survey after some targeted advocacy by PANDDA. An overview of this data was presented at our annual conference and a journal manuscript is being prepared for submission to an appropriate journal This will be important and it will summarise this workforce for the first time since AHPRA was initiated.

Australian College of Nursing (ACN)

In 2021 PANDDA began working with the Australian College of Nursing to develop a specialist study subject in Intellectual and Developmental Disability Nursing.

In 2023 a single unit of study titled "Principles of Intellectual and Developmental Disability Nursing" was finalised and is now available as an elective subject within The Graduate Certificate in Aged Care Nursing and The Graduate Certificate in Community and Primary Health Care Nursing at the Australian College of Nursing.

This unit of study is designed for nurses who work with people with intellectual and development disability across their lifespan in a variety of settings from the home to hospital. The content covers the integral role of the nurse in building therapeutic relationships with the person and their support network. Students learn about the aetiology and epidemiology of various intellectual and development disabilities and how to support people living with them from diagnosis and as they transition to adulthood and older age.

The unit was written by specialist nurses, including some PANDDA members, for nurses. Students will be supported by a team of clinical experts, working within the specialty.

Council of Nursing and Midwifery Organisations (CONMO)

Ongoing membership of CONMO is important for PANDDA as we sit alongside most of the Australian specialty nursing colleges/associations.

CPD Webinars

PANDDA members are continuing to be offered access to free CPD opportunities, non members can attend for a small fee, in addition to the annual conferences. 20 webinars have been provided to date with 2 further planned before the end of the year.

Every Nurses' Business - NDIS mainstream health system capacity building project

PANDDA remains a leading strategic partner on the "Every Nurses Business" project, which was extended through to July 2024. Led by Professor Andrew Cashin (Southern Cross Uni) and myself (Western Sydney Uni), this partnership also includes the Australian College of Critical Care Nurses, the College of Emergency Nurses, the Association of Primary Nurses, and the ANMF. PANDDA committee members have been supporting the online synchronous learning sessions and this continues to earn PANDDA some much-needed money.

National Roadmap on the Health of People with Intellectual Disability

PANDDA is represented on the Roadmap Implementation Governance Group (RIGG) and the Education Advisory Group..

The National Centre of Excellence has been awarded to a consortium led by UNSW, and PANDDA looks forward to working with the Centre into the future.

The TSANZ position statement: Respiratory Nurses. This statement he Thoracic Society of Australia and New Zealand's (TSANZ) Position Statement recognizes the pivotal role respiratory nurses play in the lung health of Australians and New Zealanders.

<u>Thoracic Society of Australia and New Zealand Position Statement: Respiratory nursing - Smith - 2022 -</u> <u>Respirology - Wiley Online Library</u>

In October 2022, we formed an interim working party of respiratory nurses' members to instigate the Respiratory Nursing Position Statement and to progress advocacy for respiratory nursing as a speciality area of professional practice. We have been meeting fortnightly/monthly with the working party members. This working party is now seeking broader input from the Respiratory Nursing community to participate. In 2023, we launched a Delphi survey - Consensus on priorities for progression respiratory nursing as a specialised discipline. We are currently undertaking round two in the consensus process to validate the priorities of highest importance to the progression of Respiratory Nursing. We intended to publish the results of this Delphi survey.

ADVOCACY:

The TSANZ has expanded our presence in both New Zealand and Australia this year, and has now drafted a total of 31 advocacy pieces across both countries, nearing our 2022 end-of-year record of 37 pieces. This is a 40% increase in submissions over the last two years. A full list of these pieces and more can be viewed from the TSANZ website <u>here</u>.

Name of organisation: Wounds Australia

What have been the significant activities of your organisation in the last six months?

Wounds Australia has been the leading advocate to the federal government for the establishment of a national wound consumable scheme. In May 2023, following extensive lobbying by Wounds Australia and collaborations with other leading peak health bodies, the Government announced the allocation of \$47.8mil to the creation of the scheme – a monumental achievement for Wounds Australia and a portion of the 450,000 living with hard to heal wounds. In September, Wounds Australia delivered yet another incredibly successful Wound Awareness Week culminating in a Wound Forum and Breakfast at Parliament House. The Hon, Mark Butler, Minister for Health and Aged Care noted at the forum that the Wound Consumable Scheme was the brainchild of Wounds Australia and noted that Wounds Australia needed to be congratulated on its relentless pursuit of this program. He noted the work of Wounds Australia's leaders is a 'wonderful case study of outlining a really simply, important proposition for the Government to take up."
